A striking light show and sensible camera-work — along with a 45-minute interview — make up for the fact that everyone's feet seem nailed to the floor during the 2005 performance.

Even better, both of them love to crank out blazing Bakersfield licks on that trademark Telecaster.

Reformed teen-popster Moore co-wrote this fifth CD — a first for her. Full points for that. Trouble is, most of these rootsy tunes — penned with Chantal Kreviazuk and The Weepies, among others — are the sort of overly sincere jangle-pop and Dear Diary ballads you'd expect from someone of her experience. It's a step in the right direction, but she's still got a long way to go.
