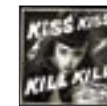

Works Vol. 1 was their most pompous album, consisting of solo fare — Emerson penned a dull piano concerto, Lake mewed cloying orch-pop and drummer Palmer showed off his chops — and just two band tunes. By comparison, the outtakes comp *Vol. 2* is a treat, with jazz, blues, boogie and *Brain Salad Surgery*. **Download:** *Barrelhouse Shake-Down*, *Honky Tonk Train Blues*

And flowers too.

Which is OK, though more originality would be better.
