**Spector / "Just Hiss" / "Madonna Freak" / "Near the Mark" (Rogue Industries)**

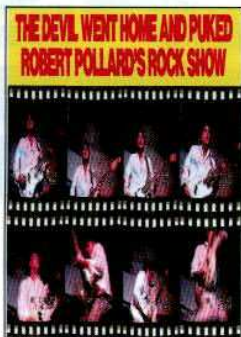
**The Brown Acid / "Try Humanity" (News)**

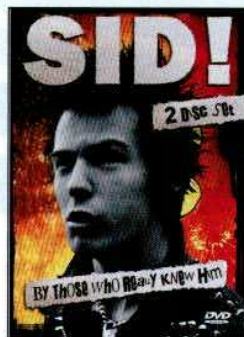

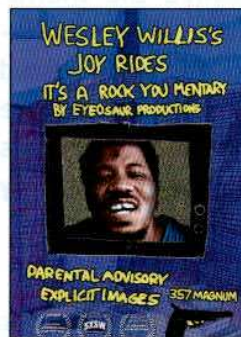

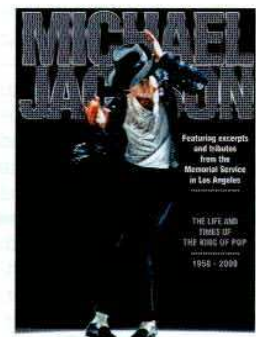

**Sid Vicious / Sid! By Those Who Really Knew Him (Odeon)**

Volumes have been written on Sex Pistols bassist Sid Vicious, but few accounts have gone beyond the headlines to describe who this punk-rock icon really was. This UK documentary is a candid look at the man as seen by London's scenesters. Interviews with ex-Pistols bassist Glen Matlock to manager Malcolm McLaren are revealing and poignant. Despite the promise people saw in him, Vicious' life ended prematurely and tragically. In the end, this is a celebration of his short, spectacular life.

**Wesley Willis / Wesley Willis's Joy Rides (MVD Visual)**

A schizophrenic born into an unstable family, Wesley Willis turned to outsider art and music as his creative outlet. A hulking manchild with a unique perspective, his artistic talent won him friends and patrons in Chicago's underground art scene. This excellent documentary tells Willis' story and shows how he managed to live out all of his dreams—which included producing a plethora of DIY albums and touring all over the country—until his untimely death in 2003.
